Members of the Law Amendments Committee:

Although our Government is limiting the number of individuals who wish to speak to the Law Amendments Committee, (and shame on you!), they can't limit the number of individuals emailing their submissions.

I am a proud Nova Scotian and unionist. When you're raised by a long serving president of the largest union in Nova Scotia, you become what you exposed to. He did so much good for the people of Nova Scotia and I feel it's my turn to do whatever I can in that respect, too. So, I put on my hat and channel my father when facing this disrespectful, anti-union Government.

My sister, Anita MacLeod, teaches junior high Phys Ed in Dartmouth and my cousin, Adele Cox, teaches in Glace Bay. My Dad was a teacher, my grandmother was a teacher, my aunt was a teacher, and my uncle was a teacher. I have countless friends who are teachers. I can read, write, do math, think critically, and understand cause and effect because of the fantastic teachers I had growing up. I have two children who are in our broken public education system. I count myself as fortunate that they are bright individuals who don't struggle with learning and therefore don't require any additional supports in the classroom – but there are many in their classes who do, and I hear from those parents the struggles their children face. Why should children have to share textbooks, sometimes which are outdated? Why should children, who don't bother showing up for class or don't complete their work, be moved in to the next grade? Why should my child have to compete with 30+ other students for teacher attention?

First, I want to thank our Mr. McNeil, Karen Casey, and the rest of our majority Liberal government for uniting the NSTU membership like never before. We saw this when each of the tentative agreements your Government offered were turned down, because in all fairness, they were a slap in the face of those people educating your children and grandchildren. We saw this when they voted 96% in favour of strike. 96%! We saw this in December, when you closed schools citing "safety issues" so you could try to force through a bill to see a contract legislated, and we rallied. We see this, this week when our membership and other unions spent countless hours over for the last two days at the legislature. We see this in the number of people wishing to speak before Law Amendments and the countless emails you will receive. WE ARE UNITED! This won't stop if a contract is legislated upon our teachers.

We are setting our children up for disappointment and failure. I work for NSCC and students can fail—and some are SHOCKED when it happens to them.
